Kyleen Beers, editor of the NCTE middle school journal *Voices from the Middle*, has approached me about the possibility of having the nation-wide common theme of "Comprehension" for the fall 2004 issue. I know this seems like far, far on the horizon, but editors need to think in these terms. What she has in mind is one core research piece appearing in all journals and then local voices responding to it. Please let me know your feelings about this idea. To my mind it holds real promise. Reading comprehension is at the heart of authentic literacy development.

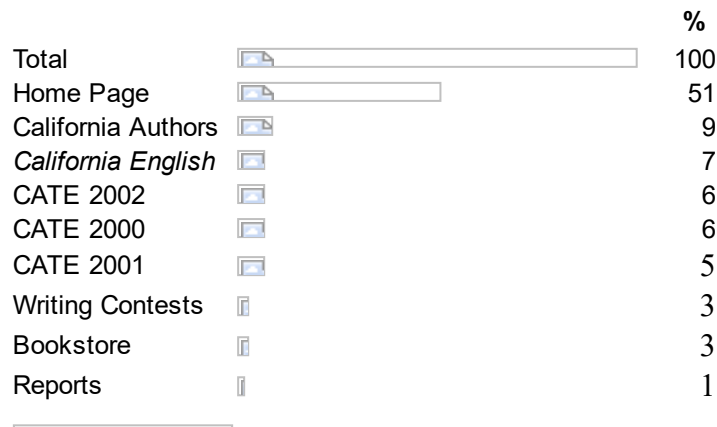
The bookstore on CATEweb does not seem to be used often. I suggest that this feature be discontinued.

CATEweb Statistics

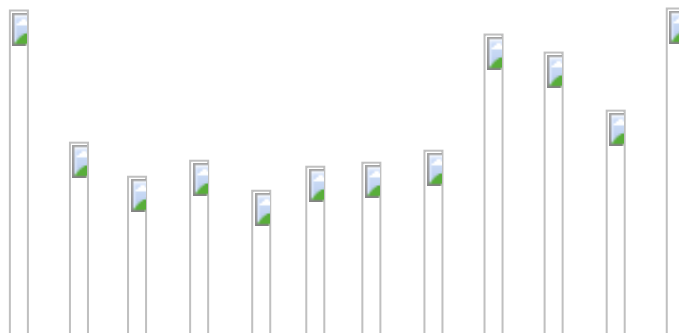
October 1, 2001 - February 2, 2002

1. NCTE Liaison Report:

A . NCTE has posted on its Web site <http://www.ncte.org/affiliates/Awards/awardsindex.shtml> all the directions and applications needed for meeting the May 1 deadlines for awards.

- We will want to consider how we will select, especially, the Leadership Development Award for 2003, which goes to one "early career teacher" (from 1-5 years experience) who has never attended an NCTE convention and who has demonstrated a capacity for professional leadership. Only one award nominee for the state will be accepted for the \$500 to be made by NCTE with the support of Prentice Hall-Pearson. (Last year, Alex Nguyen of GSDCTE was our nominee, as reported in December.)
- Other awards this year include a new one, the High School Teacher of Excellence, to a single teacher for the state; ?The NCTE Fund Award for Teachers for the Dream for an award to affiliates of up to \$3000;
- Selection of individuals, groups, or institutions that merit recognition for advancing the cause of Intellectual Freedom at local, regional, state, and national levels for the Intellectual Freedom Award;
- Selection of one issue of the Affiliate Journal for recognition in the Outstanding Journal Award.
- Submission of three different issues of the newsletter for the Affiliate Newsletter Award.
- Submission of an explanation of how the affiliate has expanded and extended its multicultural reach during the year for the Affiliate Multicultural IProgram Award;

- Submission of nomination for the Affiliate Web Site Award.
Selection of nominees and completion of forms for each of these programs must be made and communicated to NCTE no later than May 1.
- In addition, there are forms and directions for applying for the Affiliate Excellence Award, demanding extended information from a number of us, if we wish to apply, by July 15 .

3. Proposed Consideration of Policy:

With Board authorization, Past President Luby convened a telephonic conference of past CATE Presidents (Barton, Infantino, Lucas, Fristrom) and Hemric to consider the timelines and logistics of the Awards process. The Board will need to consider the proposed amendments to existing policy for the Distinguished Service Award, intending to make it more "open" and more "timely," so that nominees can be selected far enough ahead of the convention to allow their award to be publicized as part of the program.
